PARTY

Through our Emergency Service Cadet program, eligible students have recently completed their Keys for Life qualifications. As part of the course, our Cadets also attend the injury prevention PARTY (Prevent Alcohol and Risk-Related Trauma in Youth) Program at St John of God Hospital. The PARTY program was launched at the hospital in 2017 to help students aged 14 to 17 years learn about trauma and injury, and see first-hand the impact poor decision making can have on people's lives. During the visit, students hear presentations from St John Ambulance paramedics, Police officers, emergency and intensive care doctors and nurses, physiotherapists, rehabilitation therapists, drug and alcohol experts, brain and spinal cord injury survivors and hospital volunteers. Students are taught about the "ripple effect" of their decisions and how it not only affects them, but others around them, including their friends, families and future work prospects.



Be You

Be You is a national initiative, aimed at promoting and protecting positive mental health in children and young people. Their vision is for an education system in which every learning community is positive, inclusive and resilient, and where every child, young person, staff member, and family can achieve their best possible mental health. To kick off the week all classes across the school participated in a performance and workshop incursion with Suitcase Circus. Students were taught circus skills such as juggling, plate spinning, diabolos, spin sticks and hoop tricks through hands-on demonstrations and workshops run by Joe Bolton. Students then returned to their buildings for activity rotations across both Primary and Secondary.
